### A Spanish Epiphany in our Kindergartens

*"This festival of the Epiphany will assume greater and greater significance as its true symbolism comes to be understood."* Rudolf Steiner, December 1904

The first thing the visitor to Spain will notice is that Christmas is not the huge commercial occasion it is in many other western cities. Christmas lights are usually lit in the first week of December, by which time the shops are fully stocked with Christmas supplies. Nothing like the US and UK where the end of summer marks the build up to Christmas. In homes there are intricate, miniature nativity scenes called Belénes which always include the baby Jesus, Mary, Joseph and the Three Kings, Baltasar, Melchior and Gaspar.

Children may receive a small gift on Nochebuena (Christmas morning) but the day for presents is 6th January, Epiphany. For Spanish children this is the most important day of the year when they wake up to find that Los Reyes Magos (the Three Kings) have left gifts for them in their house. The Kindergarten children celebrated Epiphany this year in the Spanish way, after discussing the festival with Natalia, Alithea's mother.

## From The Early Years

A warm welcome back to you all after the Christmas Holiday! We hope you had a relaxing and enjoyable break with your family and friends. We would all like to thank you so much for your kind gifts of cards, New Year greetings and presents – we are very grateful to you all.

We are delighted to welcome three new children to our Kindergarten this term: in Katie's room is Dino, with his parents Deborah and Joel Hladecek; and Malaya with her parents Jenny and Craig Dodds. In Leigha's room, we have welcomed in Azzura (some of you will know her as 'Mini'), Aryanna and Xavier's little sister.

Our Parents Evening is next week on Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> January from 7pm to 8.30pm. Please do let us know if you are unable to attend. If there is anything specific you would like to put on the Agenda, please let Leigha or Katie know.

After the freezing weather at the end of last term, we have spent some time considering how to structure Fridays for the remainder of the winter. We would like to offer parents two options:

1. Forest Friday: a shorter session from 9am to 12noon on the Common, *OR*
2. Kindergarten Friday: a kindergarten morning from 8.15 to 12.15 at school.

**1. Forest Fridays** The morning will be structured differently than before and will focus on a 'hike' which will be interspersed with stops from time to time for running up and down hills, exploring, hunting and gathering, tree climbing, story time, songs and a picnic. We will speak to the Ranger and try to arrange to visit his horses each week. We may have a herb tea and toast stop at the Windmill café before home time.

Children will need to bring a small backpack *that they are happy and able to carry themselves*, with a change of socks, gloves and underwear, a piece of fruit and a small bottle of water. We will continue to provide a warm drink and snack. Please note, this is a 3 hour session only, not our usual 4 hours.

**2. Kindergarten Fridays** Some children find it difficult to stay warm during a long period outdoors and some may be recovering from a winter illness and for these children we offer a kindergarten session at school. This is also the option for those parents who need their children to be with us for the whole 4 hours.

Children's indoor play time will focus on spring cleaning and mending, followed by ring time, an indoor 'picnic' and story time. The morning will conclude with a short outdoor play session and collection from the Gazebo in the playground.

We are fortunate to have enough qualified and experienced staff to cover both sites, but may need a volunteer parent helper on the Common if most children take that option (1 adult to 4 children on the common). You will be able to choose your child's option each week, but please sign up at school by drop-off time on Thursday morning at the latest, in order for us to prepare appropriately for each site. We would especially like the older children to come to the common, if possible.

If a continual downpour is forecast, we will inform you by Thursday lunchtime that we will remain at school on the following day.

We will revert to all the children being on the Common together for our usual four hours once the weather improves after Easter, or perhaps earlier. We will be happy to answer any questions at the forthcoming Parents Evening.

We look forward to seeing you next week.

We have space available on Wednesday and Thursday for Afternoon Care. Please speak to Rebecca and your child's teacher if you are interested.

We have invited Dot Male, a 'Birth to Three' specialist, to give a talk about the care of young children. Dot is a Kindergarten teacher who runs Parent and Child/Baby groups. She is the author of *The Parent and Child Handbook* and runs *The First Three years*, a new three-day course beginning in early spring, focussing on the work of Emi Pickler (See attached flyer).

We are very pleased that Dot can come and in order to open the talk up to as many people as possible, the Early Years team will run a free crèche during the talk for children aged 1 to 6 from our Parent and Child group or Kindergartens. Babies can be brought to the talk.

The cost will be £5. Concessions are available. Please book with Andrea at reception.

## What's Happening in the Classrooms?
