pink ribbon. Erica has been involved in Waldorf education for over 40 years, from kindergarten teaching to leading the early years training courses at Emerson College and then in London. She has represented the UK in International kindergarten meetings around the world and run courses in Korea, Germany, Sweden, Finland, America and beyond. Erica helped plant an apple tree in the garden whilst many children assisted with planting daffodil bulbs around the tree.

Erica spoke a few words, in particular reminding us

that a garden to play in, such as this, should be the

birthright

of every single child. She wrote to us afterwards: Thank you for inviting me to this very

special opening of your Kindergarten, oh! The sun



shone so beautifully over the whole school. The leaves were tumbling down, laying a wonderful carpet to walk on, it really had a Michaellic touch to it all and a happy atmosphere. I felt that on the other side of the ribbon was an oasis for your children, it is certainly a lovely space where they can be happy and feel safe at the same time, it has a caring and nurturing atmosphere around it. The children of the whole school seem to be happy to be there and with their contributions of songs and poems it felt that the whole school was part of that moment.

In our first seven weeks of term, we have dressed up in new clothes to celebrate Eid, created chalk patterns outside for Diwali, made Dragon Bread and cooked soup over our new open fireplace for Michaelmas. The autumn festivals of light continue after half term, firstly with Halloween, and then with Martinmas, on Friday 14th November when we will be making beautiful lanterns for a family walk around the darkening gardens. Perhaps we'll hear an owl hoot, or hear mice under the rustling leaves? We'll quietly walk along our lantern-lit pathway, as the night draws in and darkness falls.

Waldorf One World fundraising event

Following the Opening Ceremony, we began our fundraising event for W.O.W. (Waldorf One World) with stalls selling biscuits, cakes, bread and popcorn, all made in-house by many of the lower school children. A 'white elephant' stall filled with donated books, clothes and toys displayed under gazebos in the autumn sunshine. A busy atmosphere of children and parents raised almost £300 which will be sent to 'Friends of Waldorf Education'. Money is distributed



to a huge range of educational and emergency Waldorf pedagogical projects around the world. These include the Kakuma Refugee Camp in Kenya where over 60,000 children are cared for, many are orphans traumatised by their experiences; Ein Burstan a Waldorf kindergarten in Israel where Jewish and Arab children are educated together; and the Goderich Waldorf School near Freetown,

Sierra Leone, set up to help educate former child soldiers. These initiatives can only manage to carry on their work with the support of donations. More information on WOW and its work can be found by going to www.freunde-waldorf.de/en.

A CRAFT PROJECT FOR PARENT AND CHILD GROUPS

Apart from preparing simple mini festivals, finger knitting was the regular craft on offer for adults during our Parent and Child Groups last year. It is a rhythmical task, pleasing to the senses using thick naturally dyed skeins of wool.

It's portable nature; wool slipped into pockets, up sleeves and on laps means it can be worked equally well sitting inside on a sofa, outside by the sandpit or standing by a swing, allowing Parents to be present for and observe their children. The children sometimes showed interest wrapping themselves in loose lengths of wool or in imitation wrapping wool around their fingers; and before long they were off, playing again.

The increasing number of finger knitted balls were used communally, kept in a big basket and could be picked up and worked on by anyone in our five groups. For some parents crafting was new and this shared project was a good place to begin. Others hadn't done any handcrafts for a long time, some since school. Without laboring the point (pun intended) Rudolf Steiner said that using our hands to create in many different ways is what



makes us truly human. Added to this, taking on a task of an artistic nature on a regular basis strengthens and replenishes our etheric forces, something that is much needed for the work of caring for young children.

A talented crafting parent showed us a link to a project of a very large playhouse made by hanging strips of cloth from a large frame. We decided to make our own version. We used an old bed canopy, the net was torn and so it was cut away. Over months, parents gradually sewed on the finger knitted strings and decorated the canopy.



During our sessions it hung at "working" level in our room and our garden. When not in use it was hoisted by a simple pulley and became a mobile to adorn our window.

We left it to the imaginations of individuals of all ages as to what it would be called and how it would be used .The parent and child group children loved to twist in the strands and play in and out of it whilst the adults sewed. A girl aged 2 ½ called it her house and sat inside with her doll, later inviting her Mother to "tea" Sometimes there was chasing and laughter and to others it was a quiet place to hide.

The children from Kindergarten and Lower School called it a rainbow and made wishes inside. One called it a giant woolly jellyfish and pretended to be scared. Another took a "shower" inside. One parent carrying it upside down and back to our room remarked that it looked like a big bowl of woolly spaghetti.

We have since had further suggestions from a handwork teacher, we could make another with beads threaded on the top, or add felt cut outs. We could make finger knitted string curtains for doors and windows. The possibilities are as endless as the imaginations of children and adults alike.
