A week before half-term, Class 6&7 headed for Liverpool Street Station, where we boarded a train for Ipswich. An hour or so later, we were trudging along a canal heading towards the Ipswich Marina and our home for the next five days: a 72' sailing ketch called Faramir. The vessel is owned by the Cirdan Trust who organise sail training voyages for groups and soon we were sitting in the saloon beside the galley for a safety briefing with the Skipper, Dawn, and First Mate, Paul. Then it was all hands on deck where we learned the ropes were actually called lines and we cast off towards the open sea. The newly press-ganged crew soon found themselves hoisting the mainsail (Two, six, heave!), coiling the lines, making tea, taking turns at the helm, cooking meals, making tea, raising the anchor, swabbing decks (yes, they really did!), making tea,



learning about the different sails and the weather and boat safety, experiencing seasickness (never again, some said), and making tea. It was an incredible five days of very challenging hard work and upon reflection when we returned, many said they might not necessarily do it again but all agreed it was a good experience. Some also commented, "I'll never look at the sea in the same way again," and, "When I see a ship at sea, I know what that feels like now."

What's Happening in the Classrooms?

Class 6&7

Class 4&5

We are preparing for one of the most treasured and moving experiences of their school lives: their expedition to the Olympics. At the end of June, they will join 500 other children for a 3-day training camp, followed by a day of Greek Olympic events - Dash, Marathon, Javelin, Discus, Long Jump, High Jump and Wrestling.

The children have been training since Christmas in these events in their Games lesson. In Handwork, they have been making the white tunics they will wear. In the Main Lesson, we have been hearing Greek myths for the last term and a half, and now we reading Homer's Odyssey and immersing ourselves in Greek history.

With the siege of Troy over and Odysseus trying to make his way back to Ithaka, we have travelled forward in time by 1000 years to Greece's golden age, a mere 2500 years ago. Here we find the City States established in isolation from each other, separated by high mountain ridges, so that two cities, less

than 100 miles apart, developed diametrically opposite philosophies; one valued only hard work and warfare, denied love and beauty and produced one of the most successful armies in the ancient world, while the other prized, above all, eloquence, art, poetry, music and the beauty of the human form, and yet also produced one of the most successful armies in the Ancient World.

These two were, of course, Sparta and Athens, so influential in their training and perfection of the human body, that their names have become our words 'Sport' and "Athletics'. There was some interesting discussion around the differences between these two things, and the children came to the conclusion that sport was more competitive, usually involved teams and was all about winning, whereas athletics was about individual striving - doing your best.

The cities of Greece allied themselves either to Athens or to Sparta and fought amongst themselves for hundreds of years. In the next two weeks, we will find out what these two cities had to do in order to defend, not their own cities but the whole civilisation of Greece against attack by 'Barbaros' - uncivilised people, barbarians, non-Greeks, uncouth people with beards! foreigners!
