






Class 10 through the view finder - observational drawing.

This term class 10 undertook a module in observational drawing, and it seems apt at this time of year with seemingly less and less foliage, to take the time to look a little closer at the objects around us and reveal the hidden secrets of nature during the winter months.

They began the class with Julia Wallace making and learning how to use a view finder. Along with looking closely at all manner of things, they discovered the challenges of observing and drawing shadows on white bottles. Seems simple? You are mistaken! There is a lot to find within the reflections the variations.



within the reflections, the varying tones of shadow and how often the mind is tricked between line, contour and shading.

During the second week the class was split into two. Half the class

continued developing their focused drawing and the other joined me to work on building technique in mark making using pencil, charcoal and gouache. We began by looking at the various techniques established by artists such as Van Gogh and Manet and took time to develop the right-sided brain techniques in shape, contour and line by

devolving an image and drawing it upside down for example.


The final week was spent observing and drawing plants, taking into account the learnt skills. By closely looking at leaves and flowers the students, began to realise how intricate each form is. They often spent the whole morning working on one leaf, which in turn gave them the confidence to look less at their paper and more at the exactness of what was presenting itself.

At the end of the module they had a surprise drawing assessment, where they where asked to sit in silence for Ih 15minutes drawing either a spoon, jug or leaf. A real act of zen meditation for many! And of course they all managed very well with attention and focus.


The students' devotion to sticking to what they saw and not drawing what they thought they saw, reminded me to pay a little more attention to my own surrounding environment, especially during the harder months ahead, in fact I'm very much looking forward to discovering all the smaller details in the frost, moss and fungi, soon to emerge.

Mechanics and Engineering in Class 10



During the second half of the term, Roy Allen, our visiting Physics and Maths teacher, took Class 10 for a block of Mechanics, with the focus on forces. In the High School, the students have art, craft and movement blocks first thing in the morning and Roy offered a block of engineering. Four of the students took it up and built a suspension bridge, applying the principles learned in the Main Lesson. (AB)

For a Morning Module we built a [suspension] bridge with Mr Allen. We started the block with no materials, so for a week and a half we learnt about the different types of bridges, and spent time sending back the materials the


company sent us, as they were wrong. When we finally received the wood we started cutting the A frame, in which we cut diagonal lines which were bolted together and then we fitted a cross piece. We then cut the ply wood into three rectangular pieces and reinforced them from underneath. On the last day of the block we started assembling the bridge: first we stood the A frames up and hung rope from a tree on either side. Afterwards we strung rope from the decking to the A frame.

WOW DAY

Thank you to everyone who helped make our WOW Day such a success; to everyone who donated goods for our sale, who baked, set up our stalls, served, cleared up and took all unsold items to our nearby the Age UK Charity shop!



We made £340 and there is still money coming in.

This fine sum is being split between <u>The OneSpirit Ashram Kitchen</u>, an organisation of which Nicola Coombe (Class 5 parent) is a part, and <u>Der Freunde</u>, who organise WOW.

The OneSpirit Ashram Kitchen is serving breakfast and dinner to 350 people a day at the migrant camp in Calais, known as the New Jungle. The kitchen has been running for two months out of the vision of my colleagues Ian Wood and Jonathan May within the OneSpirit Interfaith Foundation. As they got to know the conditions in the camp they realised an ashram-style kitchen would provide food and also warmth, friendship, and integration. lan wrote recently on the operation's Facebook page. "This has come about from a random group of people, all having something in common.... feeling in their hearts, a compassion for their fellow human beings in front of them suffering. One small action of giving eases the pain for the receiver and the giver. So many of these displaced people are escaping from the most terrible circumstances, or they wouldn't take these desperate risks," he says.

A second way people can help is by sending money to help fund the purchase of food supplies. Donations are welcome via BACS transfer to lan's bank account, and people are asked to write 'CalAid donation' in the reference line. His details: I Wood, Acc no. 02952600, Sort code 165810 (a dormant personal account devoted to this purpose). "We would also really appreciate people holding the whole situation of the migrants in their hearts and in their prayers," says Jonathan — and not only the estimated 5,000+ in the Calais camp, but the tens and hundreds of thousands on the move towards the borders of Europe, and across the continent."

Alys Mendus, a Steiner Teacher and PhD student researching 'Sharing stories of educating differently', visited school on Friday 20th November. She came to talk to the Upper School students about the two weeks that she spent as part of an 'Emergency Pedagogy' intervention on the isle of Lesbos with the German Waldorf Charity 'Die Freunde' at the end of October 2015. The approach uses Waldorf teaching methods to help traumatised children and young people deal with their lives and hopefully begin to heal. They used eurythmy, games, painting, drawing, wax modelling, felt making, form drawing, singing and storytelling and of course a lot of mime as most of the children did not speak English!

Alys explained in her stories of how it was mirror working with the Syrians - educated, passionate people wanting to live in a safe place and have education for their children and everyone had their mobile phone! One family had lost everything except for their phone and selfie stick and insisted on a selfie as a memento. Each morning she would help with the queues of people at the refugee camps entertaining the young children with puppets and songs, chatting to parents with a phrasebook and smiling a lot! Each afternoon she would work with the unaccompanied minors, the 12-18 year olds that had been sent alone to secure safe passage for their whole family at a later date. It was with these young people (mostly boys) that the more in depth work could happen.
