This term, six students from Class 11 chose to do two intensive blocks of pattern cutting and dressmaking. They designed and constructed patterns from their own measurements, made calico tiles to test them, made alternations, redrew the patterns and then cut and finished their final garments in the second block. 












West Africa

West Africa comprises all the different climates of the continent.

If you were to set out on a journey from north to south across west spice, you would pass from the desert to the Sahel, the souranna and finally reach the tropical landscape of the south-east.

To the north are the countries of Mauritania, Mali and Niger where you can find oil, phosphotes and wanium. To the south-east is Sierra Leone where there is an abundance of diamonds under the ground. These diamonds were named blood diamonds because there was a line when they were traded for weapons to fight in the war. Just below that is Liberia where rubber trees grow.


To produce rubber they take the sop of the trees and add chemicals to harden it (now they have found a way to produce it without using the sap.) Along the I vory coast there are co coa, pineapple and banaha trees that the people eat and sell. Palm trees also grow there providing palm oil. In Nigeria you can find palm wine (an alcohol which ferments within two hours of being exposed to oxyge), yours (a reactable similar to a potato), cassava (a rooty vegetable), millet, rice and the kolo nut which you can chew


to give you energy.


The Empire of Mali began in 1240, around the same time as the crusades in Europe. It was a lot larger than the country is now and it was a very rich Empire. The Emperor had lots of induspences, he sat in a big balcorry and had entertainers and other luxuries. They also had 10,000 diab horses which were very important to them. A very important city was the city of Timbuktu which is on the bend of the river Niger in Mali. It was a trading point for merchants from the north and south and it was the centre of learning for West Africa. The Arabs were very strict and forced everyone to learn Koran.



They are stars like me in the form of humans.


But I am still more star than human.

"Even though we move differently, we are still connected and teamwork is important."

"The reason this production fills me with immense satisfaction is because unlike an essay or a presentation based on past discovery and facts, our piece bared no basis apart from the music and us; we were the inventors and forgers of this new and unparalleled product..."

"I believe that the most significant lesson we have learnt was working as a group and to be able to intuitively connect with one another."

"I feel like I produce something more satisfactory when I don't overthink things too much and instead tap into my inner inspiration, express it through my sounds/instruments. This is like with eurythmy when we see more true forms by listening to the music, our inspiration."

"Eurythmy almost acts as a vehicle of understanding and overcoming the different challenges evident in life."

"To me 'the storm' was the most satisfying part. We went through different stages; the unknown, the confusion and frustration, the thinking we know, the despair, and finally the knowing- it was like a whole life in 10 seconds. This block has been one of the most rewarding and satisfying experiences I have experienced."
