




Geomorphology

As part of the class 9 geomorphology block, we studied the phenomena of earthquakes, volcanos (both acidic and alkali) and midocean ridges around the world to lead us to an understanding of the theory of plate tectonics. Additionally, we journeyed to the south coast for a field trip; to Lulworth Cove, the **Etches Fossil Collection and** Kimmeridge Bay. Here we studied t h e geomorphological formation of these areas and their palaeontology and geology. Class 9 prepared in groups, 3 posters to show their understanding of these two areas and the museum they visited during their trip. We invited class 6 to come and visit us in our classroom, as they are studying geology at the moment, and class 9 students presented their findings to them.

Ecology


In class 11 we deepened our study of the local area, looking at the Longford River and Hanworth Park. Here we took to the river for the first time and used kick-sampling to study the invertebrate population of the river. This work will feed into the <u>ongoing riverfly monitoring programme of the Longford River</u> which examines the health of the river. This work will help build a 6-month baseline of invertebrate population for the river which will help determine any future pollution incidents.

We also took transects across the park collecting quadrat, soil and pH data in January to look at the effect of cutting the grass versus not cutting the grass on this unique acid grassland area. What we noticed is that ant hills <u>had been levelled</u> which are a vital part of the food web of the park. We hope these will recover and the ground-nesting skylarks won't be affected. The plant data will consider the rare plants <u>noted on the park</u>, such as harebells.

The class made two posters relating to the phenomena they have studied; these are some of the first results gained from the river. In class 12 they will go on to study the river Crane too.

Further work will be carried out on the park in the spring/summer months as more plants will be in flower. If you would like to join in with on-going monthly studies of the park do get in contact.




During class 12 biology specialists' ecology intensives we investigated the flow of two different local rivers and the affect of pollution tolerance on freshwater invertebrate diversity. In translation we spent a lot of time in waders and looking at tiny creatures that live in the river bed. Anything we couldn't identify in the field was brought back to the lab to identify under a microscope where we saw a careless caddisfly's cute little moth face, a midge pupa and a water flea with its overwintering eggs and spring eggs.

Please note that Judith has purchased from Colombia some beautiful bags hand made by the indigenous wayuu community in Colombia.

These special indigenous people are largely known for their strong weaving tradition. The Wayuu carry on this traditional weaving. It is said the Wayuu learned to weave thanks to a mythical spider called Walekeru.

It takes 3 weeks to make one bag.

The Wayuu consider themselves to be the protectors and custodians of an ancient culture based on maintaining a harmonious alliance with nature. They consider natural elements such as mountains, trees, and animals as their skin.

Wayuu family structure is a matrilineal and matrilocal one that gives women and the maternal side of the family special importance.

When Judith visits Colombia again she will bring back some beautiful items from the indigenous people for everyone so that the school can again benefit.

You will be able to purchase this bags at the Thursday or Friday craft group and at the school fair, or direct from Judith. The profits from the sale of the bags will be donated to the school for their benefit.
