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Deep in the forests and jungles of the Thames Basin, an intrepid explorer or curious anthropologist may happen upon the encampments of the local inhabitants. Several rough but sturdy structures have been built in the thickets, serving as shelters, meeting places and shops selling coloured powders, fragments of highly prized ceramic, clay sculptures and nourishing snacks of threecornered leek - a local delicacy.

These builders and merchants, usually to be spotted between the hours of 10.30 - 11am, and later between 1.30pm and 2pm, are generally a peaceable and friendly people, dressed in varied clothing, depending on their clan. Occasionally, territorial disputes break out between different groups and they have been known to go on raiding parties to steal each others' building materials. Most of the time, though, they are hard at work collecting and creating the wares for their stalls - they grind the powders, shape the clay and collect the three-cornered leek which they offer to passers-by.

Class 3 Building





Class 5&6 went on a trip to Hadrian's wall in Northumberland in mid April. This year the children have been learning about the Romans, who among other things—were good engineers, building roads, aqueducts and walls all over their vast Empire. The children walked more than 10 miles daily along the wall, visited Roman sites and had a wonderful time overall!







Class 8 Chemistry


In this final year in lower school class 8 students studied the 7 ancient metals, organic chemistry and biochemistry – covering 3 main areas of 'alchemy'. They carried out food tests identifying those which contain sugar, proteins and starch; in these photos students can be seen using iodine to test for starch. They investigated the 'science of cooking' by making fudge, bread, butter, cheese, hollandaise sauce and meringue! Soap was made with a full morning of stirring. After a day or two of waiting students decorated their soap and took it home for Easter gifts, each containing their personal choice of essential oils.



Class 10 Human Body Systems

As part of this main lesson students consider the dynamic wholeness of the human organism linking 'thinking' – sense/nervous system, 'feeling' – circulatory & respiratory systems and 'willing' - digestive & lymphatic system together as well as looking at the endocrine and male and female reproductive systems. They discover that all such 'systems' are intrinsically linked and that we find out more about them when we study diseases which affect them. Students went on to study diseases such as stroke, leprosy, dementia and endometriosis. This study of our inner systems links to the discussions which pop up in class related to relationships and the world around us. Here are some of their initial coloured clay-work of these 'systems'.

Class 11 Embryology



Embryology follows on nicely from work done on human body systems in class 10. Students study oogenesis and spermatogenesis, the fertilisation of an ovum by a spermatozoa and the subsequent metamorphosis of the embryo into a foetus. Students had an opportunity to visit da Vinci's embryological drawings at Windsor and we had a mother and baby come into class to visit us. With this birth stories are shared and students get to openly discuss pregnancy, birth and parenthood. This rich block involves work in clay, drawing, writing, debating, microscope slide work and relating their understanding to the world with each student taking on independent research work looking at subjects such as the embryological development of the

eye, home v. hospital birth, da Vinci's work and relating human birth to that of the cow, thalidomide, genetic versus physiological diseases in the womb, Dolly the Sheep and CRISP-R. Here are class 11's drawings.














Seismology at Schools in Nepal



They say 'without earthquakes there are no mountains.'

At Easter I was invited to Nepal to present at the 4th International Workshop on Educational Seismology organised by Dr. Shiba Subedi and his colleagues at 'Seismology at Schools in Nepal'(SASIN). The workshop was aimed to train teachers from various districts of Nepal, equipping them with the necessary instruments, skills, and knowledge to educate pupils about earthquakes and their preparedness. A total of 60 participants attended, including teachers and students from more than 40 schools. In 2023 I presented via zoom to their 3rd workshop an 'Earthquake evacuation procedure guide' for schools related to my past research work and my experience as a teacher and fire officer here at our school. In 2024, I re-presented this work in person with active earthquake evacuation practices at a local secondary school and at the workshop venue and I was asked to speak about 'Earthquake education in the UK'. One of the aims of this project is to support earthquake education and provide schools with a 'Raspberry Pi' seismometer, <u>if you are interested in supporting this important work go here</u>.

I was also invited to visit the 'Maitreya Pathshala - Pokhara Waldorf School'. Here I was able to meet with staff, and

share a meal cooked by Bishnu, one of the school founders. It was the most delicious 'dhal baat' made with biodynamic produce gathered from their school garden with a glass of fresh cow's milk from their own cows. I got a full tour of their school and gardens and we shared stories about our schools. They will be having their first class 10 next year. <u>They'd love to be able to purchase a 'Raspberry Pi' for their school</u>; which would not only support their earthquake preparedness but they could also use in the classroom. I'd like to present a bit more on my visit and ideas for the future in our next school newsletter and a fundraising evening at some point (if anyone would like to help organise this!) but until then I leave you with a couple of photos from this trip.


